2. **BRING RECIPE ON 3x5-inch CARD FOR ALL ENTRIES.** Recipes should be from “scratch” except class 1-106. (State on card if you do not want your recipe published). Your name needs to be on the card.
3. All items will be disposed of following the Fair.
4. **Food Safety rules as follows:**

Food baked product competitions: Filling, frosting, glazing, pie filling, and meringue whether uncooked or cooked are not permitted to contain cream cheese, whipped cream, unpasteurized milk or eggs/egg whites (pasteurized eggs or eggs cooked to 160 degrees may be used). No home-canned fruits, vegetables, or meats are permitted in products. Recipes must be provided that show which ingredients were used in each part of the product. Contestants should carefully wash their hands and make sure that their hands do not have any open cuts before preparing foods.

Whenever possible, baked products should be transported and stored in chilled coolers (41 degrees F). Judges and individuals who will consumer products from county and state competitions should be informed that they are at risk for food borne illness since the established policy **cannot** guarantee that an entry which is a “potentially hazardous food” has been properly prepared or handled before, during or following the competition.

5. Decorated cakes may be box cakes or a cake form. They will be judged whole.
6. Decorated Cake competition open to professionals and nonprofessionals. Those who earn \$600.00 per year from cake decorating must enter in the professional category.
7. Pies may be baked in a 4-inch pie pan.
8. **Other entries use disposable heavy cardboard covered with foil, a foam plate or a disposable aluminum pan.**
9. We prefer that cakes not be iced but if they are, icing will also be judged.
10. **REMAINDER OF BAKED ITEM MAY BE PICKED UP AFTER JUDGING.**
11. Wilton will sponsor special awards in this department.

5. No plants or flowers will be entitled to a prize or other award unless they possess points of superiority.
No award will be made to unworthy specimens even though they may be the only one of their kind on exhibition.
6. Add a commercial floral preservative to water when you bring flowers to exhibit and they will last longer.
7. People earning \$600.00 or more per year arranging flowers are eligible only in the professional division.
8. Exhibits which have previously won may not be reentered for judging.
9. Fresh flowers may be brought in during the week to freshen your exhibit.
10. All exhibits must be homegrown flowers – **NO artificial flowers and NO purchased flowers.**
11. All entries must be fresh, clean and free of insects.
12. **Children who enter must have helped to plant and cultivate.**

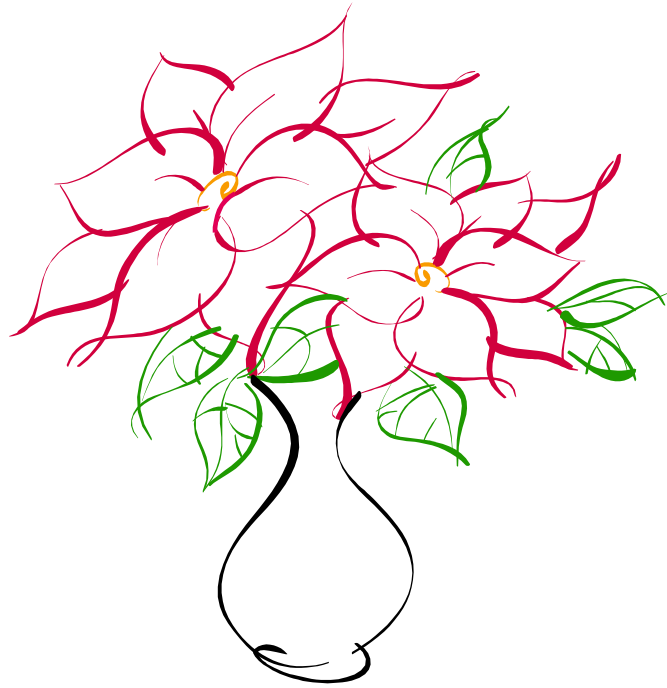
